CAPTAIN HARRY C. ALLENDORFER, JR., U.S. NAVY

Captain Harry C. Allendorfer, Jr., was born in Johnstown, Pennsylvania, the son of Harry C. and Agnes B. Allendorfer. After two years preparatory work at Valley Forge Military Academy in Wayne, Pennsylvania, he entered the United States Naval Academy with the calses of 1942.

Because of World War II, Captain Allendorfer's Class graduated in December, 1941. Soon after graduation he was ordered to the Gunnery Department of the heavy cruiser USS WICHITA. During the course of World War II, WICHITA steamed in all major theaters of the war. The ship saw action on the Murmansk convoy runs in the North Atlantic; the invasion of North Africa; South Pacific operations at GUADALCANAL, NEW GUINEA, THE CAROLINES, PHILIPPINES, MARSHALLS and MARIANNAS, OKINAWA, and amphibious landings on KISKA and ATTU in the Aleutians.

Immediately following the war, Captain Allendorfer assumed duties as Operations Officer for the Naval Occupation Force in Japan. In 1946, he patiticipated in the first nuclear weapons test at Bikin it Atoll and after a tour as assistant to the Inspector General of the Pacific Fleet he became Flag Secretary and Personnel Officer to the Commander Destroyer Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet.

His next assignment transferred him to the Naval Gun Factory in Washington, D.C. where he served as Aide and Public Information Officer. After a tour on the Staff of Commander Destroyer Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet he assumed command of the Destroyer Ecott, USS MALOY. While Commanding Officer of MALOY, his ship, in addition to regular fleet operations, participated in ASW experimental missions under the Operational Test and Evaluation Force.

In 1952, Captain Allendorfer was ordered to the U.S. Naval War College in Newport,

During this tour he married the former Nancy Carroll of Wheeling, West Virginia. Upon completion of his tour at the Naval War College, Captain Allendorfer assumed command of the USS MILLER, based in Newport, Rhode Island, While in command, he saw service in the Western Atlantic, Caribbean, Mediterranean, and Middle East. He was then ordered to the Staff of the Chief of Naval Operations, where he was assigned duties as Chief Briefer and Officer in Charge of the CNO Flag Plot in the Pentagon. Here he regularly briefed the President, Secretary of State, members of Congress, and other high government officials as well as the Chief of Naval Operations and other senior officers in the Department of Defense.

In 1960 he assumed command of Destroyer Division 202 and, during this tour, in addition to fleet operations in the Western Atlantic and Caribbean, participated in a SOLANT AMITY cruise to the western and southern coasts of Africa. He was next assigned as Executive Assistant and Aide to the Commander in Chief, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, Commander in

His next duty was that of Chief of Staff and Aide to Commander Carrier Division TWENTY and Anti-Submarine Warfare Group FOUR. During this tour he saw continuous service in the Atlantic and Caribbean areas, and in the Mediteranean with the U.S. SIXTH Fleet, Primary employment of ASW Group FOUR was conduct of Hunter-Killer operations, but on several occasions the group participated in the GEMINI-astronaut recovery operations.

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

Upon commissioning in June 1932 he reported for duty aboard the USS FARRAGUT (DD-348) and served as First Lieutenant and Assistant Gunnery Officer.

During World War II he patricipated in the invasions of Guadalcanal, Attu, Kiska, Kwajalein, Eniwetok, Saipan, Tinian, Guam, and Hollandia and took part in the Battle of the Eastern Solomons. He received as Submarine Assessment Class "IB".

From October 1944 to March 1945 he was a student at the U.S. Naval Gun Factory, then reported for duty aboard USS VESOLE (DD-878) as Gunnery Officer; eventually becoming Executive Officer. In March 1946 he was ordered to the staff of the U.S. SEVENTH Fleet for duty in the Logistics Division. In July 1964 he was assigned duties as Assistant Operations Officer on the staff of Cruiser Division THREE. Following this he was ordered for duty as First Lieutenant aboard the USS CORAL SEA (CVA-43).

From September 1948 to June 1950 Captain Davis taught Naval Science at the University of Wisconsin, then was ordered to duty aboard USS ROANOKE (CL-145) as Assistant Gunnery Officer.

From July 1954 to June 1957 he taught ordnance and gunnery at the U.S. Naval Acadmy, In July 1957 he became Commanding Officer of the USS MCAFFERY (DDE-860).

Captain Davis was ordered to the staff of Destroyer Flotilla TWO in July 1958 to serve as Operations Officer until July 1959, when he became Commanding Officer of the USS BLANDY (DD-943). From August 1961 to June 1962 he was a student at the Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island, the then reported to the staff of the Commander in Chief Pacific for duty in the Planning Division. He was promoted to Captain on September 1, 1962, and one year later on September 1, 1963, he became Commander Destroyer Division SEVENTY-TWO.

Captain Davis reported to the NATO headquarters of the Supreme Allied Commander Atlantic (SACLANT), in Norfolk, Virginia, on September 20, 1964, to serve as Deputy to the Assistant Director of General Plans , in the Policy, Plans and Operations Division.

Captain Davis is authorized to wear the Navy Unit Commendation, the Navy Occupation Ribbon (Japan and Italy), and the American Defense (with star), American Campaign, United Nations, and the National Defense Medals.

DESTROYER SQUADRON THIRTY TWO 3 June 1965 - - 28 Jan. 1967

During the time that Commodore Allendorfer has had the privilege and good fortune to command the 3000 officers and men of the "ANYWHERE ANYTIME" Squadron, its tensips have steamed nearly one million miles in most of the oceans and seas of the world. As an integral part of the Anti-Submarine Hunter-Killer "TASK GROUP ALFA", the squadron operated extensively in the Western Atlantic Ocean and Caribbean Sea and was deployed with the SIXTH FLEET in the Mediterranean Sea. A total of 105 anti-submarine topedoes were fired in ASW exercises and the squadron's drone helicopters (DASH) flew


329 hours and made 6000 successful landings.


Over 44,000 rounds of ammunition have been fired from the squadron's 5"/54, 5"/38, Over 44,000 rounds of ammunition have been fired from the squadron's 5"/54, 5"/38, 3"/50, and 3"/70 guns in the past twenty months. 27,000 of these rounds were fired at Viet Cong targets in Vietnam by eight ships of the squadron which operated with the SEVENTH FLEET in the South China Sea and Tonkin Gulf. As a result of this bombardment with over 800 tons of ammunition, an estimated 2000 Communist troops were killed or wounded and heavy damage was inflicted upon enemy installations and equipment which included 2700 military structures such as fortifications, supply depots, ammo dumps, tactical bunkers, tunnels and trenches. Interdiction firing by the ships sank 40 supply sampans, killed 50 pack animals and wrecked a bridge. On a half dozen occasions, accurate naval gunfire from Destroyer Squadron 32 ships broke up strong enemy attacks on isolated friendly outposts and has been credited with saving the lives of hundreds of linited States and Vietnamese soldiers and marines. In addition to providing navale gunfire United States and Vietnamese soldiers and marines. In addition to providing naval gunfire support for troops ashore, ships of the squadron screened Tonkin Gulf aircraft carriers against attack by Communist PT Boats, submarines, and aircraft. In so doing, they made a significant contribution to the effectiveness of United States air attacks against North Vietnam. Seventy officers and men have been decorated for their outstanding performance

Vietnam. Seventy officers and men have been 'decorated for their outstanding performance of duty with DESRON 32 in Vietnam and additional awards have been recommended. The ships circumnavigated the globe by proceeding to Vietnam by way of the Panama Canal and Pacific Ocean and returning through the Indian Ocean, Red Sea, Suez Canal, Mediterranean Sea and Atlantic Ocean.

One ship of the squadron, USS NORFOLK, made the 1965 UNITAS Cruise around South America as part of the SOUTH ATLANTIC FORCE, promoting good will and enhancing henispheric defense through extensive ASW operations with various South American navies.

Destroyer Squadron THIRTY TWO is a part of CRUISER DESTROYER FLOTILLA FOUR which is assigned to the UNITED STATES ATLANTIC FLEET CRUISER DESTROYER FLOTICA was assigned to the UNITED STATES ATLANTIC FLEET ANTI-SUBMARINE WARFARE FORCE. In Operations at sea in the Western Atlantic and Caribbean, the squadron was assigned to the UNITED STATES ATLANTIC FLEET ANTI-SUBMARINE WARFARE FORCE. FORCE and the UNITED STATES SECOND FLEET. On deployments, the squadron operated with the UNITED STATES SIXTH FLEET, the UNITED STATES SEVENTH FLEET and the UNITED STATES FIRST FLEET.
