Dear Folks, Friends and Family,

Here we are once again! We are again at sea in deep blue water.

I must brack-track again to bring you up-to-date. On 4 June the MUX steamed into the Gulf of Tonkin to refuel and by virtue of sailing into the gulf, all hands become members of the "TONKIN GULF YACHT CLUB" and thus are entitled to all the rights and priviliges, such as they are, of the said organization.

As the month of June draws to a close, life for the men of the MUX completes another gunline cycle. After spending the first four days of the month shelling enemy positions from off the coast of Vietnam, the "Mighty MIX" steamed north for six days of R&R in Hong Kong. This port, the most beautiful in the Orient, was an instant hit with the MUX sailors. With extended liberty hours, the crew found time to shop in her world famous shops and enjoy all-day tours through this British Crown Colony.

The tours took us to such places as Victoria Peak, with its beautiful panoramic view of the city of Hong Kong, its scenic harbor and the city of Kowloon across the harbor; the floating village of Aberdeen, a village of boat people (the boat population of the colony numbers over 100,000) that spend their entire lives of work and play on boats, and with the floating restaurants where you can pick your fish swiming in a tank and see it cooked before your eyes - a most tasty meal, I can assure you; Tiger Balm Gardens - the Disneyland of the Orient; and a view of the Red Chinese Border from the Lok-ma-chau Police Post, with the city of Canton, Red China only 70 miles distant across the valley and over a range of mountains - the Sham Chu River is the official border with a 15 mile buffer no-man's-land on either side.

The rehabilitation of the crew after the second gunline patrol was made much easier and pleasant by such wonderful sights. A lot of the crew, including this Captain, bought some fine clothes also here, along with many presents for the dear ones at home.

After four days of sailing the MUX arrived in Sasebo harbor for 14 days of upkeep, to routinely repair the ship, and continue our rest and recuperation. Sasebo, a quiet Japanese city, offered her guests a chance to refurbish the ship and rest up for their final gunline tour. Numerous divisional picnics were scheduled in the fleet park. All day tours to Nagasaki (the A-Bomb site) and Unzen National Forest afforded sightseers and shutterbugs a chance to put our feet on dry land and see the country. On Friday, June 21st a ship's party was held in downtown Sasebo.

Meanwhile work aboard ship proceeded smoothly and efficiently, so that on 30 June, the MUX sailed out into the Sea of Japan on her way

back to Vietnam and her final patrol on the gunline for this cruise. We go again to do the job we've learned in defense of democracy.

I would like to say a special hello to the wives and families of BM1 Franklin Gentry of Horsham, Pennsylvania, MM2 Burt Spencer of Morgantown, West Virginia and CS2 Joseph Anzalone of Bronx, New York, new members of our MUX Family. Welcome aboard, you're now part of the MULLINNIX Family.

We have also transferred a number of our old MUX'ERS and we say Sayonara to SN Richard Burkhouse of New Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, BT2 Stan Huikko of Litchfield, Minnesota, RM3 Mike Steele of Westallis, Wisconsin, QM1 "R" J. Ankerberg of Big Rapids, Michigan, LTJG Michael Larkin of Norfolk, Virginia, CS2 Dough Morris of San Antonio, Texas, RD2 Robert B. Brown of New Orleans, Lousinia and EM3 Heroico M. Sanchez of Uvalde, Texas. We will continue sending the MUXPACGRAM to you all.

We have just learned of the death of our Shipmate, friend and buddy Tom Elliott in an auto accident at home after discharge from the U. S. Navy. Our deepest condolences are extended to his family, to Mr. & Mrs. R. L. Duffie who notified his many friends aboard the MUX.
