GUN division is responsible for the repair and maintenance of three 5"54, MK 42, MOD 7, rapid fire guns mounts, magazine sprinkler systems, and numerous small arms, in addition to the equipment used by the ship's self defense force. GUN division is made up of highly trained professionals that keep three gun mounts weighing 145000 LBS, and made up of 158000 parts, 123 relays, 104 solenoids, and 308 major switch assemblies. During one minute of sustained fire these components work together in 320 individual movements and, while deployed, it was done without a major casualty.

### COMMANDING OFFICERS



Commander Thomas W. Yankura was born in Uniontown, Pennsylvania on 23 August 1940, where he attended public schools. He graduated from Springfield College in 1962, with a Bachelor of Science in Education, and received a Master of Science in Community and International Relations in 1963. He entered the Navy

through the Officer Candidate School in Newport, Rhode Island. After commissioning in 1964, he embarked upon his career as a Surface Warfare Officer in the destroyer force. During his early career, Commander Yankura served as the ASW Officer aboard USS JOHN R. PIERCE (DD 753), and following graduation from destroyer school, he completed two tours as Chief Engineer, aboard USS WILKINSON (DL 5) and USS JONAS INGRAM (DD 938). Additionally, he completed a tour as Officer-in-Charge of a Combat Coastal Patrol Detachment (Swift Boats) in Vietnam and was assigned to the office of the Chief of Naval Operations in

the division of Strategic Plans and Policy.

From August 1973 to August 1975, Commander Yankura attended graduate school and was awarded a Master of Education and an Advanced Study Degree in Guidance and Psychology. In December of 1975 he became the Executive Officer of USS VALDEZ (FF 1096) until December 1977. On 3 May 1978, following school at Millington, Tennessee, Commander Yankura reported for duty at the Human Resource Management Detachment, New London, Connecticut. Commander Yankura holds the Bronze Star Medal with the Combat "V". He is married to the former Ann Scott of Springfield, Massachusetts. They live in Groton, Connecticut with their son Thomas, 6 and daughter Michaelens. Michaelene, 3.

Commander Peter S. Labyak was born in San Diego, California on 19 September 1939. He graduated from Severn School, Severna Park, Maryland in 1958, after which he attended the U.S. Naval Academy, graduating in June 1962. Commander Labyak's first assignment was USS DEWEY

(DLG 14), where he served as the damage Control Assistant. Subsequent sea tours have included duty as Chief Engineer aboard USS SHELTON (DD 790), Commanding Officer of Oceanographic Unit TWO aboard USNS DUTTON (TAGS 22), and as the Executive Officer of USS KOELSCH (DE 1049).

Commander Labyak's first shore duty came in 1967 when he was assigned to the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, where he earned a Masters Degree in Oceanography. He is also a graduate of Destroyer School and Armed Forces Staff College. In March 1973, he was assigned as the Executive Officer of the Navy Recruiting District, New York. Prior to assuming command of MULLINNIX, Commander Labyak served in the Executive Office of the President (Telecommunications Policy), Washington, D.C.

Commander Labyak is a designated Surface Warfare Officer, and is a command, control and communications subspecialist. His

decorations include the Legion of Merit, Navy Achievement Medal, and the Navy Expeditionary Medal.

Commander Labyak is married to the former Gail C. Merrill of Norfolk, Virginia. They have three children: Theresa, born 1966; Laura, born 1968; and Daniel, born 1972.

Commander Labyak has seen deployments of two, five, and six month duration, in addition to numerous exercises and gunfire support qualification cruises. While serving as Commanding Officer, MULLINNIX rose from just another Atlantic Fleet unit to a truly outstanding ship, a "superstar."








#### RECOGNITION ABOARD MULLINNIX FOR . . .





During the deployment, MULLINNIX became one of the few fleet "superstars" in retention. This successful goal required superior performance by the entire chain of command, and encompassed an active participation by MULLINNIX in bringing a variety of Navy programs to the crew. One of the most effective programs was the recognition of those crew members who went beyond the call of duty in the performance of technical expertise and military behavior. These were awarded letters of commendation, appreciation and, as was the case with 12 individuals, Navy Achievement Medals.

Occasionally a sailor decides to put forth maximum effort in learning about his ship. During the cruise many men earned the Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialist (ESWS) silver cutlesses. This is indicative of one who is qualified in basic PQS applicable to him, has completed the ESWS PQS book, and has gone before a board to demonstrate his knowledge of the ship.



#### **FISHING**


One bright spot in those long, tedious patrol periods was the terrific fishing experienced by the crew. Though the land was barren and unhospitable, the waters teemed with finny creatures quite uneducated in the ways of western lines and tackles. Trolling off the fantail with feather jugs accounted for tuna, albacore, barracuda, dolphin, and sailfish. Bottom fishing and casting produced groupers, snappers, cobia, king mackeral, rainbow runners, triggerfish, and jacks.

Good spots will be remembered: Bal el Mandeb for its albacore, dolphin, barracuda, and billfish; Bahrain Light for groupers and cobia; Arab Bank for vast numbers of rainbow runners.

The first annual Middle East Angling Derby saw some nice fish entered. SKC Riggs won the trolling category with a 22LB dolphin, and LT Fetherston took first in the bottom fishing category with a 30LB cobia. Other notable catches included a 24LB cobia by MMC Newey, a 15LB sailfish by STG1 Englehart, an eight-foot white tip shark by MAC Evans, a 22LB grouper by STG2 Bogan, and a 150LB bull shark on 50LB tackle by MM3 Barclay.


